The Most Reverend Bishops Robert Shaheen and Gregory Mansour have issued the following Lenten guidelines for the Maronites of the United States:

Mar. 17, 2013

- All Maronites who are physically capable [...] all Fridays of Lent.
- ❖ Great Friday of the Crucifixion is also day of fasting. Fasting in the Maronite Church involves eating and drinking nothing at all (except water and medicine) from midnight until noon. The rest of the day normal meals can be taken but without meat. All Maronites who are physically capable are to fast on these two days.

PS: Women who are pregnant and persons who are sick are not required to fast.

Habemus Papam!

We thank Almighty God that a short time ago, the Cardinals in Conclave elected Jorge Mario Bergolio, the Cardinal Archbishop of Buenos Aires, Argentina, a Jesuit, as the 265th successor of Saint Peter. He has chosen the name Francis.

Born: December 17, 1936 **Ordained Priest:** December 13, 1969

Ordained Bishop: June 27, 1992 March 13, 2013 **Elected Pope:**

According to the Liturgical notes from the USCCB, "Again, the faithful should be exhorted to pray for the newly-elected Holy Father in their private prayers. The recitation of the Our Father, Hail Mary, and Glory Be for the intentions of the Pope is encouraged. The newly-elected Pope should be prayed for in the recitation of the Rosary."

Some facts about Pope Francis

Here are some additional facts about Pope Francis.

- 1. Bergoglio was born in Buenos Aires in 1936. His father was an Italian immigrant.
- 2. He's the first pope from South America. The only remaining continents that have never had a pope come from their lands are Australia, Antarctica, and North America.
- 3. He's the first Jesuit pope.
- 4. He only has one lung. His other lung was removed due to infection when he was a teenager.
- 5. Bergoglio is known for his personal simplicity. In Argentina he lived in a simple apartment rather than the archbishop's palace, cooked his own meals, and gave up his chauffeured limousine in favor of taking the bus to
- 6. In 2010, when Argentina became the first Latin American country to legalize same-sex marriage, Bergoglio encouraged clergy across the country to tell Catholics to protest against the legislation because, if enacted, it could "seriously injure the family" and that gay adoption would be "depriving (children) of the human growth that God wanted them given by a father and a mother."

- 7. He studied and received a master's degree in chemistry at the University of Buenos Aires, but later decided to become a Jesuit priest and studied liberal arts at the Catholic seminary in Santiago, Chile.
- 8. At the age of 76, Francis is the ninth oldest pope of those elected after 1295. (Benedict, who was elected at the age of 78, was fifth oldest.)
- 9. Last year, Bergoglio compared Catholic priests who refused to baptize the children of unwed mothers to the Pharisees of Jesus' day. "These are today's hypocrites. Those who clericalize the Church," he said, adding, "Jesus teaches us another way: Go out. Go out and share your testimony, go out and interact with your brothers, go out and share, go out and ask. Become the Word in body as well as spirit."
- 10. His doctrinal orthodoxy emphasizes Christ's mandate to love: he is well remembered for his 2001 visit to a hospice, in which he washed and kissed the feet of twelve AIDS patients.
- 11. Also, he has served as Ordinary of the Ordinariate for the Faithful of the Eastern Rites in Argentina.

A humble pope

According to the Vatican press briefing, after the first appearance and blessing last night, Pope Francis went back to the cardinal's residence, Casa Santa Marta, on the little bus with the other cardinals rather than take the car with the plates SCV1. Pope Francis went this morning, his first full day as Pope, to the Basilia St. Mary Major to venerate the Madonna "Salus Populi Romani". He returned in one of the squad cars of the Vatican Gendarmes without the big entourage of cars. He ditched the Papal Mercedes to ride over to his hotel, to collect his luggage, in a Volkswagen to personally pay his bill, with his own money. He went to the office and paid the bill for his room!

Year of Faith: Some Papal Trivia

Age matters: Popes elected as young as 24, as old as 81

Ambrogio Piazzoni, Vice Prefect of the Vatican Library and author of a book on the history of papal elections, has compiled "some curiosities" about papal elections. On the topic of the age of the pope at election, he notes:

- Three popes were under the age of 25. The last was Pope Gregory V, who was 24 when elected in 996.
- Seven were between 25 and 40 years old. The last was Pope Leo X, who was 37 in 1513.
- ◆ Eleven were between 41 and 50. The last was Pope Clement VII, who was elected in 1523 at the age of 44.
- ◆ 24 popes were in their 50s. The most recent was Blessed John Paul II, who was 58 years old when he began his papal ministry in
- ◆ 37 were between 61 and 70 years old. The last was Pope John Paul I, who was 65 when he began his 33-day papacy in 1978.
- Only three popes were over 80 when elected. The last, chosen by cardinals in 1406, was Pope Gregory XII. He was 81.

FAMOUS LASTS

- The last pope who was not yet a cardinal when elected was Pope Urban VI in 1378.
- → The last who was not even a priest yet was Pope Leo X.
- ♦ The last born in Rome was Pope Pius XII, elected in 1939. (He was also the last serving Vatican Secretary of Dtate elected.)
- The last African was Pope Gelasius, elected in 492.
- The last native of Dalmatia, an ancient Roman province, was Pope John IV in 640.
- The last Frenchman elected was Pope Gregory XI, in 1370.
- The last Greek was Pope Zachary in 741.
- → The last Englishman was Pope Adrian IV in 1154.
- The last Italian was Pope John Paul I.
- The last Dutchman was Pope Adrian VI in 1522.
- The last Palestinian was Pope Theodore in 642.
- The last Pole was Pope John Paul II in 1978.
- The last Portuguese was Pope John XXI in 1276.

- The last Syrian was Pope Gregory III in 731.
- The last Spaniard was Pope Alexander VI in 1492.
- The last German was Pope Benedict XVI, elected in 2005. It had been 950 years since a German -- Pope Victor II -- had been elected.

AND FINALLY

- Pope Leo XIII is the oldest pope in history, living until age 93 years and 104 days. He was elected at age 67.
- Pope John Paul I survived only 33 days in office, passing away Sept. 28, 1978. It created a rare year of three popes.
- \$\P\$ JPI was the first pope born and the last to die in the 20th century.
- \$\Phi\$ He was the first pope to take two names, and the first to use "the first" in his regal name.

HEALING OF THE BLIND MAN

Jesus was on the way to celebrate his last passover. He was traveling along the road to Jericho, a resort city, also known as the City of the Palms. Jericho was 15 miles from Jerusalem and every Jew living in the area was required to attend to the passover there. If they were unable to attend, they were required to stand along the sides of the roads and listen to the rabbis who taught as they passed by.

This passover was a very tense one. Jesus was considered a rebel, one who was preaching against the orthodox Judaism. He was now openly proceeding to Jerusalem, teaching as a rabbi. If what Jesus was teaching was true, the entire Temple worship was irrelevant. Jericho was filled with priests and levites who took turns in serving at the Temple. Naturally, they would be concerned about what Jesus had to say.

Jesus and his entourage were aproaching the gate of the city where a blind beggar was sitting. It was a good time to beg for alms because of the number of persons who walked by. The gospel gives his name as Bartimaeus. Bartimaeus heard the tramping of feet and the noise of the crowd and asked who was passing by. When he heard that it was Jesus, he began to shout and make noise to attract Jesus' attention. Everyone who was trying to listen to the Master was offended and tried to silence the beggar. But this was the only chance for the beggar. Jesus was passing by and he wanted to escape from the world of darkness.

When Jesus indicated that he wanted to meet Bartimaeus, the attitude of the crowd changed. They told the blind beggar, "Courage, sit up. He is calling you." The beggar's response was immediate. He threw off his cloak and rushed to the Lord. In many ways, we are called to be like a beggar. Certain opportunities come only once. When the Lord calls us, we must throw off everything that will hinder us and run to Christ.

The blind man knew what he wanted; he wanted light. Not only was the beggar to receive the gift of sight from the Lord, he was also to receive the gift of inner light, the gift of faith. How courageous Bartimaeus was in his desire to seek the Light of the world. Many of us desire to remain in the darkness. Let us not allow the world to prevent us from seeking the Light, but let us cast aside all that hinders us and go to meet the Lord. "Through the rays of your light, we shall see the light, O Jesus, full of mercy."

Icon Description: As the season of Lent reaches its climax, we have



the icon of the healing of Bartimaeus, the man born blind. This icon personifies the central theme of light found in the Maronite liturgy that Jesus is the true light of the world. Here, blind Bartimaeus, the beggar, is seen to be stepping out of darkness into the healing light of Jesus' touch. His staff and moneybag represent his former way of life; now he walks straight and can see because of Jesus' light, represented by

large concentric circles around Our Lord, in shades of gold and blue. The disciples stand behind Christ, also bathed in this divine light.

Kids Korner

In Jesus' time, the crippled and the blind shared a common fate. Their only source of income was begging. People willingly gave them money, considering it a godly act to share with the poor, but they still looked down on beggars. After all, why were they crippled? Was it because they had sinned? Would God punish people who were truly righteous? Bartimaeus



sat at the side of the road, clutching a beggar's pouch. The crowd was becoming bigger, noisier. Bartimaeus asked "Why is the crowd growing louder?" "It's Jesus—Jesus of Nazareth is coming" a man shouted. Bartimaeus believed that Jesus could heal him. He cried out: "Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on

me!" "Bartimaeus, What do you want from me?" Jesus asked. "Rabbi, I want to see..." Bartimaeus felt the hands of Jesus touch his eyes. Ever so slowly, he began to see colors, reds and greens and blues. "Go" Jesus told him. "Your faith has healed you."

GOOD FRIDAY COLLECTION

In a letter sent to Bishops around the world, Cardinal Leonardo Sandri, Prefect of the Congregation for Eastern Churches, made an appeal for the Good Friday Collection in support of the Holy Land. The people of the Holy Land, along with their pastors he said, "live the mystery of Christ, Crucified and Risen for the salvation of mankind."

The Holy Land, he said, "is the silent witness and living custodian, thanks to the Latin communities of the Patriarchal Diocese of Jerusalem and the Franciscan Custody, as also to the Melkite, Maronite, Syrian, Armenian, Copt and Chaldean faithful active there".

Cardinal Sandri went on to say that the assistance that comes from the annual Good Friday collection maintains not only the Holy Sites but also the communities that dwell around them.

"Together with institutes of men and women religious, the funds collected provide immediate relief to the catastrophic consequences of war and other emergencies," he said. "Through a qualified network of pastoral, educational and health care specialists, these resources come to the aid of families, often saving lives that have been rejected: the old, the sick, and the disabled. In addition, aid is provided to those without work and to youth in search of a brighter future. In every case, the collection seeks to build up human rights, especially the right to religious liberty."

Holy Saturday broadcast of Shroud

The Shroud, venerated as the burial cloth of Christ, bears a mysterious image of a man who suffered in a manner consistent with crucifixion. It is kept in the Cathedral of Saint John the Baptist in Turin, Italy, and is rarely available for viewing.

The extremely limited access to seeing the shroud gives the TV broadcast particular significance. It will be shown internationally by the Italian public service broadcaster Rai 1. The Holy Saturday broadcast of the Shroud images is only the second-ever, with the other occurrence taking place in 1973. The TV exhibition will last about an hour, and will be part of a celebration led by Archbishop Nosiglia.

Holy Saturday, the archbishop observed, is "a day of silence, prayer, contemplation of the mystery of the passion and death of the Lord, but also a day of expectation and openness of heart and life in the light of the resurrection."

Archbishop Nosiglia voiced his hope "that this worldwide event will leave, in the hearts of many people who will see it, a little light and peace in these complex times and give strength and hope to many sick and poor, but also families and people in need."



Eternal rest grant unto them, O Lord and may perpetual light shine upon them. May they rest in peace.


