Do Not Be Afraid

The last words in this week's Gospel reading is Christ instructing His disciples not to be afraid. No matter what age, no matter what state of life, no matter what you've gone through, fear is something we all will encounter. When you think about it, in a lot of ways fear is a great equalizer. We will all have to deal with fear. Yes, there are an awful lot of things all of us deal with that frighten us, and a lot of them for good reason. Fear is a Dream Killer! It's the biggest and most common obstacle for us not responding passionately to God and to life! Fear paralyzes, and it magnifies failures. Worst of all, it brings an acceptance of the status quo, cost what it may. Our fears are the single biggest thing that keeps us from actually moving forward and accomplishing great things in both our immortal and mortal lives.

"Do not be afraid" aren't just words. A lot of us, however, treat them like just a nice, wishful sentiment. Kind of like a Hallmark card - get well soon, wish you were here - do not be afraid! "Do not be afraid." How good it is for someone who is worried to hear those words especially from Jesus. Jesus is a model for us in coping with anxiety and distress. Jesus had to accept and overcome His own fears the night before His Passion. What was the remedy Jesus used to overcome worry and distress? Having faith in His heavenly Father and sharing the cause of His worry in prayer with the Father. He knew we need to hear those words. Jesus, who was human as well as divine, knew that some of us need to be reminded again and again and again not to worry. So many times in the Gospels we hear Jesus asking us not to worry. It is one of the most constant choruses echoing through all of scripture.

The good news is that we can awaken and choose a relationship of love and trust with God over fear. When we feel fear – we must fall into our fears and learn to trust in God catching us because of our prayers. It is the love of God for us, and our trust in God, that shrinks fear. Love and trust is the antidote to fear.... We have to fall through our fears, and on the other side is a loving relationship with God that drives out fear. Unless we cast off our fears, we won't be able to experience Jesus Christ in our lives

May we hear God's chorus "Do not be afraid" deep in our hearts.

The Ottomans & Independence


In 1516, the Ottomans defeated the Mamlooks. The Maronites were granted protection by France. They expanded in Lebanon and mixed with other minorities. The Maronites built churches, founded religious orders, formed schools, and cultivated arid lands. The valleys and the mountains were filled with monks and hermits. Many families converted to

Christianity, joined the Maronite Church, and participated in the table of the Lord. But between 1845 and 1860, hatred was incited by the Ottomans, who worked so hard to break the Maronites' spirit of independence. Dozens of villages, churches, and monasteries were completely destroyed. Thousands were martyred or displaced, and many migrated. The persecution returned between 1914 and 1918, when the Ottomans blocked the roads to the mountains of Lebanon causing a human disaster. Tens of thousands of people died of famine and diseases, and thousands migrated. After the First World War, Lebanon was liberated from the Ottomans. France, Lebanon's compassionate mother, entered the mountains of Lebanon. The Maronite Patriarch left for Paris. He arrived on October 25th, 1919. He requested the recognition of Lebanon as an independent country. On September 1st, 1920, General Gouraud proclaimed the State of Greater Lebanon in the presence of the Maronite Patriarch. In 1943, Lebanon won its independence.

Saint of the Week - Blessed (Abouna) Yacoub, the Capuchin

On June 26, we celebrate the feast of Blessed Abouna Yacoub the Capuchin. Blessed Yacoub was born Khalil Haddad in 1875 in Lebanon, the third of a family of 14 children. At the age of 18, he joined the Capuchin Order and chose the name Yacoub. During that period, Lebanon was going through a difficult time due to conflict and starvation. With God's grace, he undertook numerous charity works including



the construction of homes for the elderly, poor and orphans, health centers for abandoned children, hospitals and nursing homes including the Christ the King centre. The charism of the Blessed Capuchin is alive in the work of his spiritual daughters the Franciscan Sisters of the Cross of Lebanon. He spent long hours in prayer and had a true sense of hope, doing everything for the glory of God. He did his best to do charitable works and let God do the impossible. He died on June 26, 1954, at the age of 80 and was beatified in Lebanon in June 2008.

One of the most important teachings he left us is trust in the goodness of the Lord and in Divine Providence. Abouna Yacoub invites us to believe in Providence, in the Lord who loves us and thinks of us. We ask for his intercession so we may become witnesses to our Christian faith and carry to the world a message of peace and charity and conserve the dignity and rights of all people, especially the poor, without any distinctions.

Prayer of Abouna Yacoub

"O Jesus, my Lord, take my tongue and make me speak what you wish, make my silence be a dialogue with you! Take my ears and make them hear the voice of duty, your voice, O Jesus! Take my eyes, and make them see you in every face and every work! Take my hands and my feet, give them agility and consecrate them to your service and to the fulfillment of your every desire! Take my thought: illumine it with your splendid light! Take my heart: make it a throne for your love and your rest."

Our Stained Glass Windows St. Charbel Makhlouf



Charbel Makhlouf was born on May 8, 1828, in the small village of Biqa-Kafra in the high mountains of Northern Lebanon. His parents were poor but religious, and their 5th child was attracted at an early age to prayer and solitude. In spite of the opposition of his family, he left home at the age of 23 and entered the Monastery of St. Maroun in Annaya. Ordained a priest in 1859, he spent 16 there before receiving permission from his reluctant superiors to retire to the nearby hermitage of Saints Peter and Paul.

It took 7 years for his wish to be granted. Only exceptional monks were allowed such a privilege. A sign that he was ready to leave the secure environment of the monastery came about in a strange way. Given a request to prepare an urgent report, Charbel sat down at night to work on it. To his dismay his lamp ran out of oil. He asked one of the monastery's lay servants to fill it for him. By way of a joke the servant filled it with water, but was amazed to see that the lamp lit up immediately and continued to burn brightly. The Superior, when advised of this, removed the lamp to check it for himself. To his amazement he found it was indeed full of water. He took this as a sign from above that Charbel was ready to live the severe life of a hermit.

For the next 23 years, Charbel lived an extremely hard life, one of severe mortification. He wore a hair shirt, slept on a straw mattress with a plank for a pillow and, for his one meal of the day was content to eat the meager leftovers from the monastery. He displayed a remarkable devotion to the Eucharist, spending hours in preparation for saying Mass and again in thanksgiving afterwards.

In 1898 Charbel suffered a massive stroke while saying Mass and died, 8 days later, on Christmas Eve. He was seventy years old. On the night he died, monks from the nearby monastery rushed to the hermitage to kiss his hands and be blessed by touching his body. Many spent the entire night kneeling in prayer beside him. The snow was falling heavily and it was extremely cold, which was not surprising since the hermitage was 4500 feet above sea level. Those keeping vigil asked each other: 'If we're suffering so much for only one night, how was Father Charbel able to live here for twenty-three years?'

After three days he was buried in the monastery cemetery and, as was the custom, without the benefit of a coffin. Like many a holy monk before him he would soon have been forgotten were it not for a very strange happening. For the next 45 nights his tomb was surrounded by a dazzlingly bright light. This was witnessed by an increasingly large number of people, none of whom could provide an explanation. Permission was sought from the ecclesiastical authorities for the monk's body to be exhumed.

To everyone's surprise his body was found to be perfectly preserved, in spite of the fact that the grave had been flooded by heavy rains, leaving the body floating on a sea of mud. Charbel

was lifted out and given fresh clothing before being placed in a wooden coffin in a corner of the monastery's private chapel. However, it was found necessary to change his clothing twice per week because of a strange liquid exuding continually from the pores of the body. Described as a mixture of perspiration and blood, it just kept coming. Pieces of cloth soaked in this fluid were soon being distributed as relics and credited with effecting cures.

St. Charbel's tomb has been a site for pilgrimages since his death. Hundreds of miracles are believed to have occurred through his intercession with God, both in Lebanon and around the world. He was beatified in 1965 and canonized in 1977 by Pope Paul VI, who had earlier hailed the Lebanese Maronite saint as an "admirable flower of sanctity blooming on the stem of the ancient monastic traditions of the East."

For the third consecutive year, the US Catholic Conference of Bishops (USCCB) has set aside **June 21st to July 4**th as the *Fortnight for Freedom*, to respond to threats against religious liberty specifically manifested by the enforcement of the Federal HHS contraceptive mandate.

As part of the diocesan-wide participation in the *Fortnight for Freedom*, Bishop Edward Scharfenberger will celebrate a Holy Hour of Eucharistic Adoration at the Shrine of Our Lady of Martyrs in Auriesville, NY, at 7:00 PM on Saturday, June 28th. All are welcome to come and pray before Our Blessed Lord with our new bishop, begging for the freedom to practice our Catholic Faith not only *in* the churches, but *out* in the public square, as well.

Please do try to come to Auriesville on June 28th and bring some friends. A flyer/poster explaining this event is attached in Adobe Format as well as pasted below. It would be extremely helpful if you could print copies to pass out and also forward this e-mail to interested people on your e-mail lists.

Finally, the Respect Life Ministry at St. Madeleine Sophie Church in Guilderland will conclude the *Fortnight for Freedom* with a **Patriotic Rosary after the 9AM Mass on Friday, July 4th**. St. Madeleine Sophie's is at 3500 Carman Road, Guilderland. We would love to have you pray and *sing* our national patriotic songs with us on July 4th.

For those who live too far to travel or who cannot be present at these events, please join with us spiritually by praying from wherever you are.

Urgent Prayer for Religious Liberty

Almighty God, Father of all nations, for freedom you have set us free in Christ Jesus (Gal 5:1). We praise and bless you for the gift of religious liberty, the foundation of human rights, justice, and the common good. Grant to our leaders the wisdom to protect and promote our liberties; by your grace may we have the courage to defend them, for ourselves and for all those who live in this blessed land. We ask this through the intercession of Mary Immaculate, our patroness, and in the name of your Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, with whom



you live and reign, one God, forever and ever. Amen.

A Statement from Timothy Cardinal Dolan and the Bishops of New York State (June 14, 2014)

Calling on Governor Cuomo and Leaders in Albany: Don't Let Us Down

More than 200 Catholic schools have closed in the last 15 years throughout New York State, as families and parishes, who strongly believe in the value of Catholic education, struggle to keep up with increasing costs. Many of our public schools also desperately need help.

To address these needs, the NYS Catholic Bishops joined a broad coalition of faith groups, community organizations and labor unions backing legislation called the **Education Investment Tax Credit**. The measure would encourage increased charitable donations to generate more private scholarships as well as additional resources to public schools. It also helps all teachers provide needed materials and supplies for every classroom in New York.

The vast majority of legislators support the bill. Why? It's because the legislation will help all children, regardless of where they go to school. It's a win-win for all families!

Although Governor Cuomo assured us he would fight to include the proposal in the state budget, in the end, we were left out.

As the legislative session ends in Albany this coming week, we pray that Governor Cuomo won't let us down. We ask that you join us in that prayer. Pray that Governor Cuomo will put children ahead of politics and fight for the Education Investment Tax Credit.
