In Case You Want to Know

While we are in the middle of our celebration of *the Season of the Glorious Pentecost,* a time when we Maronites commemorate the life of the Spirit which is the life we now lead, and especially this week, when we celebrate the feast of one of the most famous Maronite saints of modern times, St. Sharbel Makhloof, on July 23, let us pause and reflect on our Maronite traditions. Let's start with the Divine Liturgy.

The Maronite Liturgy has both rich theological and human dimensions. This school of faith links the world to heaven. Based upon the life of Saint Maron, a monastic spirit permeates Maronite prayer and liturgical life making *asceticism* (austerity and simplicity) and sacrifice an important part of our relationship with God.

In the Maronite Church, the celebration of the Eucharist is known by several names: *Qurbono* (Syriac), *Quddas* (Arabic), Sacrifice of the Mass, Divine Liturgy, and the Service of the Holy Mysteries. In this celebration, Christ is offered to the Father for our salvation and we also offer ourselves, with Him, as a spiritual sacrifice. By the actions and Words of Institution of the priest and the Invocation of the Holy Spirit, bread and wine are transformed into the Body and Blood of Christ, the sacrifice at the altar is made holy, and so are we.

Before the Holy Mysteries are celebrated, the priest and people prepare themselves. The priest, deacon or sub deacon prepares the bread and wine on a side altar.

The Divine Liturgy begins, first with the Service of the Word and then the Service of the Eucharist (Anaphora).

The Liturgy (Service) of the Word stems from the ancient Jewish Synagogue service. It is composed of hymns, psalms, the burning of incense, Scripture readings and a homily. The structure of the Service of the Word remains the same for every Divine Liturgy. It starts with a Blessing, and then a prayer of praise in the Glory to God. A unique feature of the Service of the Word in the Maronite Church is the Hoosoyo or Prayer of Forgiveness which follows. During this time the priest or deacon incenses the altar, cross and all present, as a prayer is recited or chanted, recalling God's mercy to sinful man in times past, and asking His mercy again for today. The Hoosoyo prayers themselves change to reflect the feast. These prayers serve as great catechetical texts and are particular for and carry the theme of the particular day/event we are celebrating.

The *Trisagion (Qadishat)* is then chanted in Syriac, followed by three verses of poetry referring to the feast (the *Mazmouro*). A passage from the New Testament is then read, followed by an Alleulia verse also referring to the feast being celebrated, and then the Gospel is

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proclaimed by either the priest or ordained deacon. The teachings and readings of the day are then elaborated upon and explained during the Homily. After the congregations professes their faith with the Creed, we enter into the PreAnaphora prayers and the Anaphora.

Christians, from the earliest times, had an interest in knowing more about Jesus' family, especially about his mother and his grandmother. Ann is the name of the Jewish woman who was Jesus' grandmother and the virgin Mary's mother. We know nothing about Ann from the Bible. A third century Greek manuscript called "the revelation of James" tells a fictional story about Mary and her parents Joachim and Ann. The story was probably written around the

year 160 AD, by a non-Jewish Christian.

According to the ancient story called the "Gospel of James," Ann the mother of Mary, was born in Bethlehem, where, years later, Je- sus would be born. She married Joachim from Nazareth in Galilee. Their marriage was blessed in many ways. Unfortunately, after 20 years of marriage, Ann and Joachim had no children. They prayed and prayed, and even vowed to dedicate to God any child they would have. Ann conceived and bore a daughter, and called her Mary, a com- mon name for Jewish women of the time.

When Mary was three years old, her parents presented her in the Temple in Jerusalem as a gift to the Lord. So as a little girl just three years old, her parents watched her ascend the 15 great steps to the Temple courtyard and approach the altar of sacrifice. God was there and she wished to be near him. And that is what her parents, Ann and Joachim, wished — that their daughter be near her God. The early story says that Mary spent most of her childhood in that holy place.

When Mary was 14, the age Jewish girls married at that time, she wondered what her future would be. Ann and Joachim began to arrange for her marriage, as customary in those days, and sought advice from the Jewish high priest himself. After praying for guidance, the high priest called every unmarried man from the tribe of David to come to the temple with a branch from the fields and lay it on the altar. The one whose branch flowered, he decided, would marry Mary.

Joseph was among those who came at the high priest's call, but he brought no branch with him. Yet God pointed him out as the one who should be Mary's husband. When Joseph finally placed a branch on the altar, it immediately flowered. The two were be-trothed in marriage and Mary returned to her parent's home at Nazareth to prepare for the wedding. While she was there, the angel Gabriel appeared to her and announced that she was to be the mother of Jesus. By the power of the Holy Spirit she conceived the child.

The story of Jesus' mother and grandmother as written in the Gospel of James was very popular among early Christians. It had a great influence on Christian worship, art and devotion. Around 550 A.D., a church in honor of Saint Ann was built in Jerusalem near the temple area on the site where Ann, Joachim and their daughter Mary were believed to have lived. In the 6th century the churches in the East celebrated two feasts honoring Mary

based on the story: Mary's birth and her presentation in the Temple.



The oldest church dedicated to St. Anne stands in the Arab Quarter of Jerusalem, built on the site that ancient tradition identifies as the location of the home of St. Anne and St. Joachim, and the birthplace of Mary. The first church was erected on this site about the year

475; it was replaced by the present structure by Crusaders in 1140. The building's elegant architecture and remarkable acoustics make it the finest example of Crusader architecture in the Holy Land. When the Muslims reconquered Jerusalem from the Crusaders, their reverence for Mary led them to preserve the building, converting it a school for Islamic studies. It remained thus until it was restored to Christian use in 1856.

The Maronite Liturgy

Influences on the Maronite Liturgy By Chorbishop Seely Beggiani

The Maronite Church in its liturgy is fortunate in being the heir of at least two rich traditions, those of Edessa and Antioch. The Church of Edessa traces its origins to the preaching of the liturgical contributors included St. Ephrem and James of Saroug. The first Christian converts to the Church of Edessa included the earliest Jewish-Christians. Therefore, its liturgy is strongly influenced by the world-view of the Bible. As one of the oldest established churches, it developed its prayer forms before being influenced by Greek thought. Our Maronite liturgy today still has many hymns and prayers from St. Ephrem and James of Saroug. The Anaphora of the Apostles (also known as III Peter and by the Syriac word Sharrar), which the Maronite Church shares in common with the Church of Edessa, is the oldest Anaphora in the Catholic Church, and is still found in adapted form as the Anaphora of the Signing of the Chalice on Good Friday.

The Church of Antioch was the ancient See of Peter and developed its liturgy with influences from the Church of Jerusalem. The Maronite Anaphora of the Twelve Apostles represents the oldest tradition of the Church of Antioch. St. John Chrysostom took this Anaphora with him to Constantinople and became the basis of the Byzantine liturgy. As heir to the Patriarchate of Antioch, the Maronite Church represents the Antiochene liturgy in its fullness. Thus, the Maronite Church, in its prayer life, preserves the way of worship of the Apostles and their earliest disciples.

Qorbono (Quddas)

It is fitting that the Maronite name for the divine liturgy is Qorbono in Syriac and Quddas in Arabic. The Syriac term refers to the idea of "offering" and focuses on the sacrificial acts of Christ offering himself, and on our own willingness to render our lives as an oblation. The Arabic term refers to the idea of "making holy" and refers to the fact that in the liturgy the gifts, and by analogy the participants, are divinized by the action of the Holy Spirit.

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Preparation of the Gifts

The Preparation of the Gifts reminds us that the liturgy is an act of offering by the whole community. It is the people that bring their time, treasures, and talents to the Eucharistic celebration. The bread and wine selected from among the gifts are chosen to become the Body and Blood of Christ. Similarly, our gifts and dedication to be of service to Christ are consecrated through the action of the divine liturgy.

Anaphora (an APH or a) (Gr: "offering")


The Eucharistic Prayer of the Quorbono. The Anaphora is the central prayer of thanksgiving of the liturgy in which the Trinity is invoked to accomplish the sanctification of the Offerings. The Anaphora is the second basic part of the worship service (the Service of the Word being the first). While trinary in structure, the emphasis differs in the East and West. In the Eastern liturgies, the trinary pattern of prayers is Father-Son-Spirit, culminating in the Epiclesis; while in the West, the pattern is Father-Spirit-Son, culminating in the Consecration, a decidedly Christological emphasis.

Saint of the Week: St. Sharbel Makhlouf

Although this saint never traveled far from the Lebanese village of Beka-Kafra, where he was born, his influence has spread widely.

Joseph Zaroun Makhlouf was raised by an uncle because his father, a mule driver, died when Joseph was only three. At the age of 23, Joseph joined the Monastery of St. Maron at Annaya, Lebanon, and took the name Sharbel in honor of a second-century martyr. He



professed his final vows in 1853 and was ordained six years later.

Following the example of the fifth-century St. Maron, Sharbel lived as a hermit from 1875 until his death. His reputation for holiness prompted people to seek him to receive a blessing and to be remembered in his prayers. He followed a strict fast and was very devoted to the Blessed Sacrament. When his superiors occasionally asked him to administer the sacraments to nearby villages, Sharbel did so gladly.

He died in the late afternoon on Christmas Eve 1896. Christians and non-Christians soon made his tomb a place of pilgrimage and of cures. Pope Paul VI beatified him in 1965 and canonized him 12 years later.

St. John Paul II often said that the Church has two lungs (East and West) and it must learn to breathe using both of them. Remembering saints like Sharbel helps the Church to appreciate both the diversity and unity present in the Catholic Church. Like all the saints, Sharbel points us to God and invites us to cooperate generously with God's grace, no matter what our situation in life may be. As our prayer life becomes deeper and more honest, we become more ready to make that generous response.

New healthcare resource links Catholic patients, providers

New York City, N.Y., Jul 13, 2014 / 04:07 pm (CNA/EWTN News).- A new healthcare website hopes to link together Catholic patients and healthcare providers in order to address the cultural challenges facing Catholics around the country.

"There's more to being Catholic ... than simply, 'we don't use birth control," Dr. Greg Bottaro, PsyD, said to CNA July 7, of how the faith affects participation in the healthcare industry.

"There's an integration between our faith and our professional life as a healthcare provider where we treat the person differently from the start."

Bottaro is the founder of WellCatholic, a website he hopes will link Catholic patients with doctors who uphold Catholic values in their health practices across all medical disciplines.

"We're created to be a resource for Catholics to find Catholic providers," Bottaro said, "and at the same time, it's a resource for Catholic providers to be recognized and supported for practicing according to Catholic values."

He said that while working as a Catholic psychologist in New York he was struck by how many people would ask for recommendations for Catholic doctors elsewhere in the country.

These conversations led him to realize "there's definitely a huge demand for healthcare" that respects a patient's beliefs, as well as those of their health provider.

"Story after story came in saying that there were so many ways that not having that faith in common really hurt the care they were receiving," Bottaro said.

This shared faith, he continued, is an important factor "especially when you're in your most vulnerable state. It hurts that much deeper when your faith is called into question and you're belittled or degraded because of it" in these situations, he continued.

While there are already some services that list Catholic doctors and other health providers, Bottaro said, they are typically not user-friendly and are intended for a small number of people, rather than marketed to the public.

By focusing on linking the public and healthcare professionals in an online community, Bottaro said he hoped WellCatholic could "become a Catholic household name" that Catholics go to when they need a doctor.

However, for the venture to be most successful, communities on the ground need to help build WellCatholic as an online community – specifically in spreading the word among doctors and patients.

"If people really love the vision and feel like they would benefit from this, we really need grassroots support," Bottaro said.

"Right now we're just getting started, so there's definitely a need for community support behind this."

The dates of Natural Family Planning Awareness Week highlight the anniversary of the papal encyclical *Humanae Vitae* (July 25) which articulates Catholic beliefs about human sexuality, conjugal love and responsible parenthood. The dates also mark the feast of Saints Joachim and Anne (July 26), the parents of the Blessed Mother.
