LET ME DISH YOU SOME DIRT

This week's gospel reading, the parable of the sower, Luke 8:1-15, is a very familiar portion of scripture. It can be very tempting to gloss over it and think to ourselves, "I've heard this story, hundreds of times before, and there is nothing new here for me." Because we think that we know this story so well, we think we can close our ears to what the Lord wants to say to us.

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In fact, that is the point of the parable. We need to constantly and attentively listen to and reflect on the Word of God, and then act on it.

What applied 2000 years ago still applies today. Some people are as hard as a highway when it comes to God's truth. They hear but it goes in one ear and out the other. Some people hear the gospel of Jesus Christ and like what they hear. They attend church, read scripture, and are full of excitement and joy. But they don't last long. As soon as the sun gets too hot and life's circumstances are tough, they lose interest and forget about God and His word. There is the person who hears God's word and decides to get started in the Christian life. She is serious, really wants to believe and is anxious to be a Christian and grow in her faith, taking on the Christian lifestyle. Then the thorns of life's circumstances come along and choke out the word of God. It isn't that she turned against God so much as she's turned to something else. She neglected the crop of God's truth and focused on the thorns of life's situations. And then there are those who hear the word of God. They let it sink in. They aren't distracted by the ups and downs of life. God's word grows in their lives and changes them and they produce spiritual fruit in a

Right after Jesus told his disciples the meaning of this parable, He proclaimed, "Therefore, consider carefully how you listen. Whoever has will be given more; whoever does not have, even what he thinks he has will be taken from him" (Luke 8:18). How we listen and respond to God, as he speaks to us, will determine the amount of growth and spiritual fruit we will have at the time of our personal harvest. Another way to say it is this, the condition of our hearts will determine what God's Word can do in our lives. When God's word comes to us, how will we respond to it? Upon what kind of soil within us will His seed fall?

Let's all be like that good soil. We can never lose sight, though, that good and rich soil needs to prepared and taken care of. Let our soil allow for the deep rooting of the Word of God and may we encourage the plant of faith it produces to grow by holding that Word firmly, paying attention to it day and night. We need to fertilize it with the fellowship received from our church community. It needs to be pruned with our prayer and reflection and regularly watered with worship and the frequent reception of the sacraments. It is essential that soil be weeded by us proclaiming and not losing sight of the Kingdom of God; it will be hoed by the graces we have received from the Holy Spirit. With all of that, the seed of His word will bring forth fruit a hundred fold in our soil to the praise and glory of God and our harvest will yield eternal life and joy with God in His kingdom!

Catholic, Orthodox patriarchs visit Irbil to support displaced Iraqis



BEIRUT (CNS) -- A delegation of Catholic and Orthodox patriarchs visited Irbil, Iraq, to show their support and solidarity with the more than 100,000 Christians and minorities displaced in the country by the advance of Islamist militants.

Lebanese Cardinal Bechara Rai, patriarch of the Maronite Catholics, said the Aug. 20 trip was "a first step

in the implementation of the statement issued by the patriarchs," referring to a special summit Aug. 7 to address the crisis facing Christians in Iraq and Syria. "The first and essential clause in the

statement is our support for Christians who have left their houses because of the Islamic State and other terrorist organizations," Cardinal Rai said.

Cardinal Rai left Beirut with Melkite Catholic Patriarch Gregoire III Laham, Syriac Catholic Patriarch Ignace Joseph III Younan and Syriac Orthodox Patriarch Ignatius Aphrem II. Upon their arrival in Irbil, the capital of the Kurdish region of Iraq, the prelates were joined by Chaldean Catholic Patriarch Louis Sako of Baghdad and local officials, including Kurdistan's Regional Interior Minister Karim Sinjari and Irbil Governor Nawzad Hadi.

The patriarchs visited refugees and prayed with them at three churches in Irbil hosting refugees from the Ninevah Plain. The refugees fled after being told by the Islamic State militants to convert to Islam, pay the Islamic jizya tax, or be killed. Many were robbed of their possessions before being forced to flee.

"We want all the Christians, Muslims, Yezidis, Sunnis, Shiites and Kurds to stay in Iraq and not to leave because this is our homeland, this is our culture, and civilization and we do not want to part with it," Cardinal Rai told reporters. "The ones who want to help us must work to stop injustice, help us end injustice and help our people regain their rights. This is what we want from the ones who want to help." "We cannot stand idly by and watch as evil oppresses the people. We will carry our cause to the whole world."

In a news conference before leaving Iraq, the patriarchs expressed support for human rights, including the right of Christians to remain in their homes. "We cannot tolerate the tragedy we have witnessed here today," said Orthodox Patriarch Ignatius. He urged U.N. Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon to visit the regions to determine if the displaced Iraqis could continue to live this way.

Demons Believe and Tremble

A Reflection on the Theft of the Eucharist by Satanists

A couple of years ago I wrote of an unusual experience I had at Mass wherein a person who was troubled by a demon had those demons manifest themselves at the consecration, causing the person to run out of the Church.

I thought of that long-ago incident in relation to the current events transpiring in Oklahoma City, where a satanic cult stole the Eucharist from a Catholic parish and announced plans to desecrate it at a satanic "mass" in September. Archbishop Paul Coakley filed a lawsuit, asking a judge to stop the desecration by requiring the group to return the stolen property. He indicated in the suit that the Host was to be desecrated in the vilest ways imaginable as an offering in sacrifice to Satan.

A spokesman from the satanic group, Adam Daniels, said, "The whole basis of the [satanic] 'mass' is that we take the consecrated host and give it a 'blessing' or offering to Satan. We're censoring it, [I think he means using incense], doing all things that's [sic] normally done to bless a sacrifice, which is obviously the host body of Christ. Then we're taking that and we're reconsecrating it, or the Devil does ..."

In light of the threatened lawsuit, the group returned the consecrated host to the Church. Thanks be to God. But did you notice the satanic spokesman's attestation regarding the host: "which is obviously the host body of Christ"?

Grave and sad though this incident was (and it wasn't the first), these Satanists obviously consider the Catholic Eucharist to be the Body of Christ. Unless I missed it, there have been no

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attempts by Satanists to steal and use a Methodist host, or an Episcopal one, or a Baptist one, or a Lutheran one, etc. It is a Catholic host they seek. Here then is an affirmation of the Scripture which says, Even the demons believe—and shudder (James 2:19).

Elsewhere, Scripture says of a demon that afflicted a man among the tombs, And when he saw Jesus from afar, he ran and worshiped him (Mark 5:6). And in Luke's Gospel, And demons also came out of many, crying, "You are the Son of God!" But he rebuked them, and would not allow them to speak, because they knew that he was the Christ (Lk 4:41-42).

Indeed, as many who have assisted at exorcisms can attest, there is wonderful power in holy water, relics, the exorcist's cross, the touch of a priest's stole, and so forth in afflicting demons and urging them to leave. Yet so many Catholics and others discount these sacramentals (as well as the Sacraments), using them carelessly, infrequently, or not at all. Many people, even faithful Catholics, consider them of little significance. But demons do not. Shamefully, demons sometimes manifest more faith (out of fear) in these things than actual believers who ought to revere them out of loving faith. Even this Satanist in Oklahoma acknowledges that Jesus is truly present in the Eucharist and he seeks a host for that reason, although obviously for nefarious and perverse purposes.

Saint of the Week: St. Simon the Stylite



St. Simeon was the first and probably the most famous of the long succession of stylitoe, or "pillar-hermits", who during more than six centuries acquired by their strange form ofasceticism a great reputation for holiness throughout eastern Christendom. Stylites comes from the Greek word stylos, which means pillar, or column. It was on top of a pillar that St. Simeon spent the largest part of his extraordinary life.

Simeon was born at Sisan near the northern border of Syria and began life as a shepherd boy for his father's flock of sheep. When he was just 13-years-old, he heard the Gospel passage: "Blessed are they that mourn; blessed are the clean of heart." He went to a wise old man and asked him the meaning of these words. He explained to the boy that eternal happiness can only be achieved with suffering, and that solitude is the most secure way to attain it. Impressed with this explanation, the young man joined some hermits who lived in a nearby monastery.

After some years in different monasteries, however, he retired to live alone and avoid the numerous visitors who were constantly seeking him out. He determined to take up his abode on the top of a pillar. There he remained most of the time standing, exposed to inclement weather, and absorbed in continuous prayer. He died in 459 at age 69, having lived 36 years of his life on the top of different pillars.

The Maronite Liturgy: The Pre-Anaphora The Creed

Before beginning the Eucharistic prayer, the assembled community makes a profession of faith. Faith is made up of many elements. At its most fundamental level, faith is a personal encounter with God and our definitive response of mind and heart to God in love. It creates a personal relationship between the believer and God. In faith we choose to view God, the world

and ourselves through the eyes of Christ. We choose to make His will, His priorities, and His values our values. In order to come to an understanding of our commitment of faith, to define who we are as a community, and to articulate our faith to ourselves and others, it becomes necessary to express our inner faith externally in a series of beliefs and doctrines.

In the early church, when there were many adult converts, candidates for baptism were called upon to profess their faith publicly. Concise formulas of faith or creeds were developed for this purpose. At the first Ecumenical Council of Nicea in 325, a creed was written to express the major beliefs of the church at that time. In the sixth century, this Nicene Creed was incorporated into the Divine Liturgy.

In reciting the Nicene Creed we affirm that we are a part of the Christian tradition, that we are prepared to integrate that tradition into our lives and actions. We also affirm that the Eucharist in which we are about to participate is a sign of our unity with the faith of the apostles and with our fellow believers.

Since the Creed was inserted in the Divine Liturgy at a late date, its exact place in the pre-anaphora is unclear. The Roman Church places it at the beginning, while the Eastern Churches place it after the offering of the gifts. The Maronite Church has tended to follow the Roman practice.
